EYE Collection Day + Opening EYE International Conference "The Reel Thing"

Program Saturday May 27, 11:30-18:00h in Cinema 1 at EYE

How to deal with film material that can hardly be presented due to changing technological conditions or screening contexts? On this day, EYE curators will demonstrate how film history can be made to come alive using new technologies and different presentation options, based on four films from the collection. All presentations are in English. Words of welcome from Giovanna Fossati, Chief Curator EYE.

11.30 Bloedgeld (Blood Money)

For decades this British-Dutch detective film was considered lost until it resurfaced recently. EYE collection specialists will be presenting a 'work-in-progress' version of the film which throws light on the various restoration techniques. A presentation by Elif Rongen-Kaynakçi, Curator Silent Film and Film Restorer Annike Kross.

13:15 The 1928 Olympic Games in Amsterdam

The ninth edition of the Olympic Games was held in Amsterdam in the summer of 1928. The Italian film company Luce assembled the available footage into a long film, but the material disappeared into the vaults of the Dutch Central Film Archive (Nederlandsch Centraal Filmarchief). Following the closure of this archive, the several acts of the film were dispersed over the collections of EYE and the Netherlands Institute for Sound and Vision (Beeld en Geluid). On 21 August 2016, the copy preserved by the International Olympic Committee premiered at EYE as a feature film as the result of a collaboration with EYE and Beeld en Geluid. For the Collection Day, EYE presents a special 45-minute version of the film. Introduction by Adrian Wood, Archival Film Researcher and Rommy Albers, Curator Dutch Film. Commentary by Sports Historian Jurryt van de Vooren.

14:45 Le poème électronique

This unparalleled multimedia show was performed in the spectacular Philips Pavilion at the World's Fair in Brussels in 1958. The film material is preserved in EYE's collection. Architect Jan de Heer and composer Kees Tazelaar provided a brand new digital reconstruction of Le poème électronique in collaboration with EYE. The reconstruction, which will premiere on this day, will be introduced by Blandine Joret, Assistant Professor Media Studies (University of Amsterdam), Kees Tazelaar and Jan de Heer. The new book by Jan de Heer and Kees Tazelaar: Van harmonie naar chaos: Le Corbusier, Varèse, Xenakis en Le poème électronique will be launched this afternoon. Following the presentation of Le poème électronique, Slagwerk Den Haag will perform two parts from lannis Xenakis' Pléiades in EYE's Arena.

16:45 #5 / Joost Rekveld + opening EYE International Conference presents "The Reel Thing" The work of the internationally acclaimed Dutch multimedia artist Joost Rekveld was added to EYE's collection in 2015. Joost Rekveld (1970) has been making abstract films and kinetic installations originally based on 'music for the eye' since 1991. With a presentation by Simona Monizza (Curator Experimental Film) and Joost Rekveld.
